Prerequisites: First year graduate students in Comparative Human Development.

**Course Description**: Basic introduction to the social science concepts and disciplines that inform the study of comparative human development. The aim is to equip all students, regardless of previous background or future focus with a common background. The course emphasizes close reading, analysis, and discussion of texts representative of major figures and approaches. Class time will be primarily devoted to discussion.

**Requirements**: Extensive readings. Preparation for each class discussion of a 500-word analytic summary of the argument of the principal reading and a 250-word critical response to some aspect of the argument as summarized. The analytic summary should convey the structure of the work (or theory) emphasizing its aims, basic premises, key concepts, development of the argument, etc. The critical response should indicate an important positive or negative aspect of the material read, perhaps in relation to other readings in the course, to your other courses, or to your own research interests. You must submit analytic summaries and critical responses for each class. If you cannot prepare one on time, you can submit it late for half credit. Your grade will be determined by the 14 best submissions out of the 18 submitted during the quarter.
